

## Statutory Consultation on a Proposed Change to Oaklands Primary School in the Academic Year 2026/27

This document outlines Somerset Council's proposed change to Oaklands Primary School at Preston Grove in Yeovil, and sets out how members of the public can provide their views.

This is a statutory consultation by Somerset Council in accordance with the DFE's 'Making Significant Changes ('Prescribed Alterations') To Maintained Schools' guidance issued in August 2025

## **Background**

Oaklands Primary School is a community primary school located at Preston Grove in Yeovil.

In partnership with the governing body of the school, Somerset Council proposes to increase the number of specialist places at the school's Oaklands Centre from 14 places to 32 places in the next academic year.

## **The Proposal**

The proposal is to expand the school's onsite specialist provision known as the Oaklands Centre that caters for children with an Education, Health and Care Plan and a diagnosis (or expected diagnosis) of Autism Condition Spectrum, and whose needs cannot adequately be met within a mainstream classroom.

Somerset Council and the governors of Oaklands Primary School believe that this proposal will help the school better respond to the needs of children and young people who live in the locality.

The Centre will also be re-classified as a 'specialist inclusion base' or 'SEN Unit'.

## **Questions and Answers**

### **What is an SEN Unit?**

The school's SEN unit is an Autism Centre which is a separate area of the school with classrooms and facilities offering a bespoke curriculum to children that have special educational needs which cannot be met solely within mainstream classes.

By educating these children within a small specialist environment that has been designed to meet their needs, it is much more likely that their educational potential will be realised.

### **Why is expansion needed?**

There is currently a shortfall of specialist education places in the county. Most of the existing special schools, Autism centres and SEN units are already full to capacity. As a result of this, children in the area often have to travel long distances from home to other provision.

Somerset Council is interested in building some new classrooms on the school site to enable the specialist provision at Oaklands Primary School to expand.

### **Who will the new school places cater for?**

The expanded SEN unit will continue to cater for children that have Education, Health and Care Plans and a diagnosis (or expected diagnosis) of Autism Spectrum Disorder, or those with significant social communication barriers.

### **How many children will attend the SEN unit and how will places be allocated?**

The current provision can accommodate up to 14 pupils. The expanded SEN unit will be able to cater for up to 32 pupils.

Places will be allocated by Somerset Council's Statutory SEND service in consultation with staff at the school. Children placed at the SEN unit will be local children from the Yeovil locality.

### **Would school transport be provided to children attending the SEN unit?**

Yes, if they qualify under Somerset Council's published school transport policy, a copy of which is available to read or download at:

### **Where on site will the new classrooms be situated?**

As we are at the beginning of the process, this has yet to be determined although property professionals have said there is sufficient space on the school site for additional classrooms. If the proposal goes ahead, plans will be made available for inspection when they have been drawn up.

### **How will the expansion be funded?**

The Council has received capital funding from government to increase the number of 'high needs' places. Further details are available from this website -

Somerset Council will provide the school with the necessary capital funding to refurbish and equip rooms to create the expanded SEN unit.

The school will also receive high needs revenue funding for each of the new places which will cover the SEN unit's ongoing operating costs.

### **Will the arrangement affect other schools in the area?**

It is unlikely that other state-funded schools will be affected as there are so few vacancies at special schools and autism centres in the county.

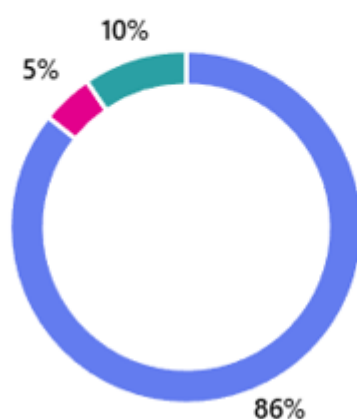
## Informal Consultation (April – May 2026)

An informal consultation was undertaken in April and May where immediate stakeholders (parents and carers of children on the school roll, and members of staff employed at the school) were asked whether or not they would support the proposal.

There were 21 responses – 15 were from parents, and 6 from staff members. Somerset Council is very grateful to all who completed the questionnaire.

The feedback showed strong support for the expansion proposal:

● Yes, I would support this proposal	18
● No, I would not support this proposal	1
● I am undecided	2



Both staff and parents/carers recognised the need for additional SEND places and the strength of the existing provision. Many respondents highlighted the positive reputation of the Autism Centre and viewed expansion as a logical next step.

While support was high, feedback also emphasised the importance of ensuring that expansion does not negatively impact pupils currently on roll.

In particular, respondents raised considerations around maintaining appropriate class sizes, staffing ratios, and the quality of the learning environment, alongside practical issues such as site capacity, outdoor space, and traffic management.

## Formal Consultation (June – July 2026)

With this document, we are now launching our formal consultation where any members of the public can have their say. Parents, carers and members of staff remain very welcome to contribute to this consultation as well.

### **What feedback is being requested in the consultation?**

Somerset Council wants to know whether members of the public would support the proposal, and whether they have any feedback they would wish to be considered.

### **Can I object to the proposal?**

Yes, you can object or comment on the proposal.

Please note that any views received after this time may not be able to be taken into account although there will be a public consultation later in the year. Parents, carers and members of staff will be welcome to contribute to the next consultation as well as this one.
